Palliative Care

Palliative Care, and the medical subspecialty of palliative medicine, is specialized medical care for people living with serious illness. The focus is on providing relief from symptoms and stress from the illness. The goal is to improve quality of life for both the patient and their family.

The Palliative Care Team is an interdisciplinary team which includes: Physician, Advanced Care Provider, RN, Medical SW and Chaplain.

Hospice versus Palliative Care



Palliative Care	Hospice
Provided at any point of the disease	Prognosis of 6 months or less. Requires the
	plan of care to shift to a comfort focus –

Not prognosis dependent	Requires the plan of care to shift to a comfort

Covered by standard insurance	Two golden rules:
	 Patient must meet criteria
	2. Patient must choose hospice
Provided in a hospital or outpatient setting	Largely delivered at home.

Where palliative care programs and hospice care programs differ greatly is in the care location, timing, payment, and eligibility for services.

Purpose of Advance Care Planning (ACP)

Patients use ACP to direct their medical care and treatment in the event that they are unable to communicate for themselves.

Communicating with Patients and Families

A key component of the provision of palliative care is effective communication skills. You can use these questions to relate to patients and their families.

- Has this been a good day or a bad day for you?
- How are things going today?
- How can I help you today?
- This must be very hard.
- I'm so sorry to hear that.
- I can't imagine what you are going through.
